1. Why are you running for City Council? If elected, what will be your priorities?

Answer: I'm running to serve, plain and simple. I am semi-retired, so I don't need the job. Nor am I seeking this office as a springboard to something else. I believe that my background in the local criminal justice system and desire to fight waste, abuse, and cronyism in city government would benefit Houston residents. My priorities will be to improve the basic city services we all expect: public safety, adequate roads and infrastructure, and protection from flooding. I will also seek to make the city more business-friendly.

2. What experience or skills have prepared you to serve as a city council member? What differentiates you from the other candidates and/or council members?

Answer: I have a juris doctorate from the University of Texas School of Law and 33 years' experience as an attorney. I have extensive experience reading and analyzing statutes. My legal training and experience have taught me to fully consider the intended and unintended consequences of a contemplated course of action. My many years' experience prosecuting violent crimes, public corruption, and civil rights violations will give me unique insights as the council tackles public safety issues. My experience fighting for victims in the courts has prepared me to fight for Houston residents.

3. What is the effectiveness of the current system for City of Houston residents to report issues/file complaints? How can this system be improved to better serve residents?

Answer: The elements of an effective system of making complaints and getting issues resolved seem to be in place with the 311 help system as the initial contact and the councilmembers as a backup contact. Ultimately, effectiveness depends on the commitment and ability of individuals within the system to be responsive. As a general observation, sometimes a given area of the city is less favored by the mayor, who ultimately controls the purse strings. This can sometimes occur if the district councilmember or the residents of the area are less supportive of the mayor's initiatives that the mayor would like. If the council were made more

powerful relative to the mayor, then this might reduce this shortchanging of certain areas. The upcoming ballot measure to allow three councilmembers to place an

item on the agenda is a step in the right direction.
