- Why are you running for City Council? If elected, what will be your priorities?
 Answer: I want to take my 30-year public service career to City Hall to work to make our city's neighborhood's safe and clean, to improve our public infrastructure, and invest in our community's youth like the future of our city depends on it. I will work in partnership with our first responders, neighborhood leaders, business owners, educators, pastors, and community-based non-profits to transform our neighborhoods to be safer, cleaner, more prosperous and where our youth are provided opportunities to have a successful and productive future.
- 2. What experience or skills have prepared you to serve as a city council member? What differentiates you from the other candidates and/or council members?

Answer: I have the Education, Training, Experience and Skills to hit the ground running on day one to be an effective council member. I started my career in the Parks & Rec Dept. working with at-risk youth in Houston's Gulfton neighborhood, and after several other successful positions, I was appointed Director of the Mayor's Citizens' Assistance Office (Mayor Brown & Mayor White), where I proved to be an effective and responsive leader of city services. For the past 15 years, I have run one of the largest Municipal Management District's in Houston/Harris County (East Aldine District), where we have taken back our neighborhoods from the gangs and drug dealers and are investing in infrastructure improvements and in our Youth's successful future! I have a BA in Political Science from University of Houston, and an MA in Public Administration from University of St. Thomas, 3. What is the effectiveness of the current system for City of Houston residents to report issues/file complaints? How can this system be improved to better serve residents?

Answer: The city's 311 system for the intake of city's residents complaints and concerns is a good start, however there needs to be an external audit to assess the effectiveness of the database and the call takers' training and responsiveness.

- Do you support the proposed Hospital Bond issue for \$2.5 billion dollars?
 Answer: Yes, the city's medical resources are far too concentrated in the Southside of town, so an important investment to bring a level-1 trauma center to the Northside is a great idea and would serve our city/county well!
