Please give your answer to each of the following questions and please include your rationale with each answer. Please be concise and clear.

- Please describe the qualifications and experience that make you the best candidate for the position for which you are running.

Answer: I currently serve as the President for Harris County MUD 150 Board of Directors, which presently manages an 8.6-million-dollar budget. In addition to overseeing the budget, the Board is responsible for making decisions that affect families, businesses, and property owners. These decisions ensure that the infrastructure throughout the District stays in excellent condition: drainage, safe and clean drinking water, wastewater collection, collect and assess fair taxes, dependable trash service, and critical coordination with the Harris County Sheriff Department for patrol and security measures within the District.

Under my leadership, the Board of Directors is also responsible for keeping our district residents, and businesses informed on infrastructure rehab projects, tax rates, water rates, elections, as well as parks & recreation within the District.

In addition to serving as the President of my MUD Board, I also serve as the President of Camden Park HOA Board of Directors. Under my leadership, the Board is responsible for managing a community with 1167 homes, two Parks, a Clubhouse, a Pool, Rentals, enhancement projects, and security. The Board also operates a 498-thousand-dollar budget.

Aside from the MUD Board and HOA Board, I presently run a small business that I started in 2000, which allowed me to gain a perspective of what government control does to the market place and what happens when the free market is allowed to flourish with minimal regulation or none at all. I believe the experiences of the MUD Board, HOA Board, and my personal experiences have prepared me to serve the people of U.S. CD18 and represent what makes America so great. Most importantly, I am driven by my Christian faith, the Constitution, Family, Community, Service, and the will to bring change.

2. Please explain what you believe are the most significant issues in this race, why you are running for this position and what differentiates you from the other candidate(s).
- Answer:** I believe Healthcare, Immigration & Border Security, supporting President Trump, and the Constitution are the most significant issues in the U.S. Congressional District 18 race. I also believe other issues like Education, Flooding, and Infrastructure are just as important.
I am running to bring change for the people, like government reform, term limits, a healthcare plan that works for everyone, and to guard the Constitution for all Americans. I am running to bring ideas that promote independence over government dependency. I am running to free the people from this indoctrination that we need the government to survive. District 18 is a large, diverse district that needs a leader that does not discriminate. A leader who can connect, relate, and understand how difficult life can be, but promotes solutions that will keep families free of government dependency. 3. What will be your top 2 or 3 priorities during this upcoming term?
- Answer:** Term limits, Healthcare, Immigration & Border Security, Flooding, Government reform, Fair tax system
4. Polls indicate that faith/trust in the US Congress is very low. What can be done to restore the public's faith/trust in the US Congress?
- Answer:** We need transparency, integrity, and return the power to the people. Most importantly, representatives need to follow through and have the will to complete the tasks that every voter elected them to do. Voters are tired of hearing the political rhetoric every representative or candidate always states during election season. " I will get term limits passed, I will stop the funding of abortions, I want to bring reform to Washington, " and once the representative or candidate wins the election, what happens? Nothing. Change starts with the voter, and as voters, we need to ensure we have the facts before we vote and hold our representatives accountable.

5. Please describe what you believe is the proper role for the federal government in job creation and intervention in the economy. What budget items need to be cut (i.e. social programs) and what taxes and fees need to be increased?
- Answer:** The government's role when it comes to job creation should only promote policies that will encourage growth in our economy, by advancing policies that will encourage businesses to invest in our economy, add jobs, investment in innovation, and capital. The government should only intervene when government policies have caused stagnation in the marketplace. Government programs are helpful and useful for families and individuals that have fallen on hard times. Still, in recent decades these programs have been abused, putting in jeopardy resources and the ability of the programs to help families in a time of need. To ensure that these programs continue, we need to enforce policies that allow families and individuals to receive assistance while providing resources that will help them become independent of government and nonprofit assistance. As an old proverb says, "We can feed you for a day or teach you to fish and feed you for a lifetime." This proverb is true not just in feeding those that need assistance but also in work and financial freedom. I will need to look at the effectiveness of each social program to determine any redundancies or wasteful policies before determining a need to terminate or to improve each program. I would, however, immediately terminate any program that funds abortion. I believe we already pay too much in taxes and fees. If elected, I will promote a flat tax plan that will benefit the individuals, families, businesses, the economy, and nonprofits.
6. Should the federal government finance and build the border wall with Mexico?
- Answer:** Yes, any nation should control the flow of illegal immigration. When we fail to enforce our immigration laws the flow of illegal immigration can have a negative impact on our economy. I support building the wall but couple it with border agents, and technology to help stop or slow down the flow of illegal immigration. However, we should try to recover the cost of building the border wall from Mexico and other southern countries where the arriving immigrants are from.
7. Do you support defunding "Sanctuary Cities"? Should immigration laws be reformed?
- Answer:** Yes, anyone who supports sanctuary cities and illegal immigration also supports Human Trafficking. We need to enforce; our immigration laws and the enforcement of our laws should not change depending on who may be President. We should consider reforming our immigration laws so regardless who may be President the laws are enforced and penalize any state or city offering sanctuary for illegal immigrants.



Robert's Position on the Issues

We cannot afford to be responsive, only proactive.

Healthcare

To fix healthcare, we need to support the idea of a free, competitive market in the healthcare industry with minimal regulation. The concept will force the insurance and healthcare industry to compete for consumers by offering the best pricing, coverage, and service. There will need to be a Public Health Commission that will be responsible for keeping a check-and-balance system to ensure that pricing does not get out of control. The commission should have consumers, doctors, hospitals, health insurance, emergency services, and drug companies to represent each group.

Free Market Economy / Jobs / Training

We should promote good common-sense policies and a balanced tax system that we govern with restraint to encourage growth in every sector of the economy. Promote policies that minimize government involvement to open the doors for businesses, investors, and developers to invest in capital, employees, training, and innovation. When this happens, everyone benefits. We should support industries that promote certified job-training programs like trade schools that give the worker the ability to train on the job.

Flooding, Drainage, & Water Collection

For decades, flooding has been a significant issue for Houston and the surrounding areas. When leadership fails to implement policies that deal with drainage, watersheds, and runoff, the flooding issues only continue to worsen as they have in recent decades as a result of over-development that overwhelms our drainage system without adequately compensating for excess runoff. Future building and development should include higher standards to account for water displacement. These plans should also include more sufficient ways to collect some of the rainfall for use or release later after the rainstorm has passed, reducing the amount of water going into our watersheds and overwhelming the system. Although in the last few years new policies & plans have been put in place to address these issues, they are still not sufficient as recent storms have proven, such as tropical storm Imelda. We can no longer create policies and plans for the short term. We need to plan for 50 years or more. We cannot afford to be responsive, only proactive when it comes to making policies and plans that affect all property owners in our communities.

Infrastructure

Our infrastructure creates the arteries of our nation, and we must be proactive and not responsive when it comes to the condition of all infrastructure, locally or nationally. This system contains many components like roads, bridges, water lines, gas lines, oil lines, power grids, drainage systems, communication lines, rail lines, and cybersecurity. We need to ensure that we keep every part of our infrastructure in excellent condition, whether underground or above ground. Failing to maintain our infrastructure puts Americans and communities at risk.

Town Hall Meetings

If I am elected, one main objective is to ensure that all the residents of the 18th District stay informed on legislation and have all the facts. We can accomplish this with quarterly Town Hall meetings, social media, and a website that is kept updated to give all residents the ability to inform themselves. I would also add an office north of the Greenspoint District to service the northern part of the district, which currently does not have a district office.

Immigration & Border Security

As a son of an immigrant that arrived in America legally, I heard my dad stress, "You are an American first. Respect the laws of America." When the laws are enforced, giving time for the arriving immigrants to assimilate and time for the economy to adjust to the arriving population, then legal immigration is good for the United States. However, if we do not enforce our laws and allow illegal immigration to flow in like a tsunami, it is harmful to the labor market, wages, healthcare system, housing, social programs, and the economy, which will put everyone in jeopardy. We should have a means like a wall to help control the inflow of illegal immigration coupled with our border patrol officers and technology to prevent, slow down, and discourage illegal immigration. We also need to pressure the nations the arriving immigrants are coming from to improve the economic conditions for their people or those governments will suffer sanctions. We should also assist the people in countries like Mexico, Venezuela, and El Salvador, to name a few, who want to remove corruption and lessen poverty, by freeing themselves from an oppressive system.

The Constitution

I define myself as a constitutionalist. We may come from different backgrounds, communities, and experiences, but we share the same constitutional rights regardless of our differences. When considering legislation, we should always ensure that our constitutional rights will not be infringed upon by our government or elected leaders. Whether you and I disagree, our constitutional rights are first and foremost.

Revitalization of District 18 and Quality of Life

In the past three decades, the quality of life has declined in District 18, partly caused by the district losing jobs. I will work with communities, MUDs, Harris County, the city of Houston to create policies that will encourage investors, developers, and businesses to invest in District 18, improving the quality of life for everyone and creating more jobs. I would also ask churches and non-profits to assist, as these organizations are vital to our communities. I will promote a program that will help families and individuals in need to gain independence from government assistance and prepare them for the workplace to help elevate them out of poverty. I ask you, in the past twenty-four years, has your community in District 18 worsened or improved in the following areas: finance, crime, flooding, jobs, quality of housing?

Law Enforcement Agencies, Community Engagement, and Civics

I will work to bring the tools our police officers need to keep our communities safe. I will work for a civics program and safety forum to promote the importance of civic responsibility, constitutional responsibility, and the importance of police and community engagement. We need police officers, and they need us to help keep our communities safe. Police officers are just like you or me. They have a spouse, children, moms, and dads that want to see them come home safely after they have spent their time protecting our communities.

Credit Card Fraud and Identity Theft

I know from personal experience what it's like to deal with Identity theft, credit card fraud, and false reports submitted to the credit bureaus. We should require all three credit bureaus to verify information provided by companies for accuracy before placing the reports on a consumer's credit report. The information should match completely, such as name, DOB, SSN, address, phone number, contract, or agreement. I believe this will help prevent credit reports from being placed either mistakenly or fraudulently on a consumer's credit report and ruining or degrading their credit and FICO score.

Social Government Programs

Government programs are helpful and useful for families and individuals that have fallen on hard times. Still, in recent decades these programs have been abused, putting in jeopardy resources and the ability of the programs to help families in a time of need. To ensure that these programs continue, we need to enforce policies that allow families and individuals to receive assistance while providing resources that will help them become independent of government and nonprofit assistance. As an old proverb says, "We can feed you for a day or teach you to fish and feed you for a lifetime." This is true not just in feeding those that need assistance but also in work and financial freedom.

Government Subsidies

I support good policies that offer subsidies for operations like family-owned farms that are struggling to compete with big, corporate farms and unfair trade policies. However, it is not the government's responsibility to provide subsidies to make a business profitable. In that case, the government is merely using American tax dollars to finance a company that generally would not be able to sustain itself. In the free market, a business either sinks or swims.

Government Bail Outs

It is not the government's or the American people's responsibility to bail out banks, companies, or other countries that want to be financially reckless with no regard for how their decisions will harm the U.S. and global economy. If these companies want to play games with their money, then let them fail. In a free market, a business either thrives or dies based on the decisions that business leaders make. Congress needs to have accountability in this area by not leveraging our children's future bailing out failing businesses.

National Security and Armed Forces

As a nation, we should ensure that every branch of our armed forces has the most up-to-date technologies, training, and infrastructure to defend our sovereignty as a nation and the American people from any threat that may come from abroad or through our borders. It's always best to be proactive rather than reactive because once the enemy is at your doorstep, it's too late.

A Balanced Tax System

As a nation, the government must charge a reasonable tax to cover the cost of government operations such as national security, border security, a working Congress, etc. However, tax regulation gets more complicated every year and demands that we pay more and more taxes. We should have a flat tax system, but to fix the tax system, we need to rein in the out-of-control government spending; otherwise, no matter what changes we make, we all will pay more and more taxes.

Education

Education is vital for our future, but I don't support this "one size fits all" educational road map that our nation has been on for decades, nor do I support the idea to pour billions of dollars into education expecting money to fix the problems. Every student learns differently, and we should provide an education system that builds on the strengths of each student, not force our kids to conform to a standard that does not adequately prepare them and tears them down. We need to change our educational system from grade school to high school. Our educational system should prepare each student for the real world. Once our kids graduate high school, they should be ready to enter fields such as energy, medicine, law, science, manufacturing, trade, engineering, or whatever our kids decide. We do this by having a workplace program in high school that coordinates with companies in all sectors of the economy, providing paid internships. The program will give school credit hours while working, and each student will receive an evaluation of their job performance at the workplace. We should also provide the choice to families to decide where their kids go to school and not force families to continue in a school system that is creating failure. We cannot continue to leverage our children's education in debt if our kids choose to further their education through college or a certified vocational school. For our children's futures, we need an educational system that is attainable and affordable.

Government Reform / Corruption

With recent events, it has become more and more difficult for you and me to trust our government. When we have FBI agents and elected representatives creating evidence and falsifying FISA warrants in the name of democracy and God to impeach a President that was rightfully elected in 2016 by the American people is very concerning. One way to guard against corruption is to inform ourselves and to verify what the media is reporting. We need to understand our constitution, in particular how the electoral college vote works in relation to the popular vote. We need to ask hard questions to candidates that are running for election. When they are no longer representing us, then it is time for a change.

Environment

We live on this planet and depend on the resources our world provides. It is our responsibility as stewards of this world to implement policies that protect and manage our environment but also allow companies to access and utilize the earth's resources to produce the energy, products, services, and medicines that we all need. To ensure that this world will be here for future generations, it makes sense to have policies and ideas that will sustain our society for hundreds of years to come.

Fiscal Accountability

It is the responsibility of each elected leader to show restraint when it comes to spending. They must work to recognize any program that has become wasteful of tax dollars and correct the problem. We cannot continue to spend as if we have unlimited funds, increasingly putting more and more debt on our children's futures. We will need to make tough decisions going forward. One area that we can start is the billions of taxpayer dollars that we send to other countries as aid or for building their infrastructure. When it comes to America's budget, America's discretionary needs are first, non-discretionary spending second, and foreign assistance is last. We need to place spending caps on our budget every year until our deficit is brought back under control.

Energy

A stable energy market is critical for the United States' and the world's economy to grow. An unstable energy market can be harmful to the economy, trade, consumers, manufacturing, transportation, electricity production, and other sectors. We must have policies and plans that provide for a stable energy market to offer a secure and stable economy for America but also the world.

Veterans

Our veterans sacrificed their lives to serve their country and communities, and once their service is complete, each veteran should be welcomed home and honored. Our veterans deserve high-quality, long-term healthcare to help them recover from injuries sustained in service. If we can spend time and money on training our soldiers, then we can spend the same time and money to care for our soldiers properly after their service is complete. We should also support those organizations like the PTSD Foundation of America and Camp Hope that are doing great work to help our veterans to cope with PTSD and transition back into society.

Human Trafficking

I am against all forms of human trafficking and any Individual, organization, or higher authority who takes part directly or indirectly in this form of human slavery. Victims of the human trafficking industry are brothers, sisters, fathers, and mothers to families in our community or communities around the world. We need to put an end to this crime against humanity by acting against countries, companies, organizations, and individuals that take part in any form of human trafficking. The Houston area is a major corridor for human trafficking, and we should have countermeasures in place to combat this problem. I ask you, what would you do if it were your loved one who had been captured by human traffickers?

Abortion

God has given his creation free will to determine for ourselves what is best for our own lives, and the Constitution acknowledges our rights. Still, the Constitution also protects life, as mentioned in the 5th amendment and the Declaration of Independence. I am against abortion, and I will always promote solutions that allow the unborn to be born, enable a family to have a child, and give women a choice without killing the unborn. Solutions like adoption private or not, private organizations that will provide medical costs and counseling, if needed, until the woman gives birth. The millions of babies aborted over the last five decades could have been a doctor who created a cure for AIDS or, perhaps, scientists who have advanced our energy technology, or maybe the unborn was someone that could have prevented crimes or murders from happening.

Term Limits

I believe our founding fathers never intended for our nation to have career representatives in office for decades. The founding fathers trusted in the republic they had formed and the integrity of their fellowmen to limit themselves from being in public office for too long. If we look at President George Washington, he served two terms as the first U.S. president, from 1789 to 1797. Establishing a precedent that was followed and respected for decades until President Franklin D Roosevelt, where he was elected to four terms as President, from 1933 to 1945, although President Roosevelt did not complete his fourth term due to him succumbing to a stroke in April of 1945. As Thomas Jefferson wrote, "I apprehend that the total abandonment of the principle of rotation in the offices of President and Senator will end in abuse" --Thomas Jefferson to E. Rutledge, 1788. He suggests that the idea was to serve in office for a brief time and mentor the next generation to follow in service. If term limits are good enough for the office of the President, then they are good enough for members of Congress.

Recently, you served on a grand jury for the 184th District Court of the July 2014 Term I.

I commend you for taking the time to serve as a grand juror. I hope that the experience was rewarding. I would appreciate any comments or suggestions you may have regarding your experience.
